Federal and match funds are being spent as originally budgeted. There is expected to be a carryover, as we had carryover funds from the previous year due to the grant not being awarded until after the start of the school year in Year 1. Carryover funds are anticipated to be used in full in the following year (Year 4) due to an increase of students served across our four areas of college preparation.

5. Describe any significant changes in your project design since the approval of your grant application Do you anticipate making changes to your project design in the coming year? If so, please describe. How have any changes or anticipated changes affected your budget? How will these changes impact quantitative outcomes and your ability to meet the project's goals?

There has been an increase in remediation efforts recently. Specifically, the number of students who are participating in remediation has grown. This increase will decrease available operating funds; however carryover funds have been allocated appropriately for the anticipated increase in costs associated with the change. If this change is successful, it will favorably impact our quantitative outcomes as more students will be better prepared for their post-secondary education. Thus, having a direct correlation to remedial rates and the ability to take college bearing courses.

There have been changes in key personnel since the grant was awarded. Scott Mendelsberg, Project Director, is no longer with the organization. Jennifer Sobanet, Chief Operating Officer of Colorado Department of Higher Education, is currently acting as the interim Project Director. A search for the new Project Director is underway and the position will be filled immediately. Nancy Mitchell, Communications Director, is no longer with the organization. There have not been any other additions or eliminations of positions. Nor are there any other anticipated or proposed changes for the remainder of the reporting period.

8. Describe any changes to the roles of your partners during the past year. Have any partners been added to your grant? Have any partners discontinued their participation in your grant? Has the role of any existing partner changed significantly?

CGU now partners with West Generations Academy. This partnership began August 1, 2013.

9. Describe briefly your project's record keeping system for collecting and reporting student outcome/achievement data and participation in GEAR UP activities. Specifically, how frequently is data collected, and what method(s) does your project use to collect and maintain data regarding student, parent and teacher participation in GEAR UP activities?

CGU will utilize its existing comprehensive online database to manage project services and assess program outcomes. This dynamic database system contains demographic data, academic progress, attendance, assessment scores, Grade Point Average (GPA), enrollment in concurrent enrollment courses and remedial courses, and services provided. The database also contains a student feature that allows program participants to build a "college portfolio," which guides students through the college admission process and helps GEAR UP staff track and support their progress. The administrative staff is able to generate daily reports on all categories to ensure students receive services and participate in activities. Reports showing GEAR UP activities and results by the month are provided to partner schools' principals and stakeholders.

10. How do you link student outcome/achievement data with student participation? How does your project use the data collected to evaluate and guide the project?

We collect annual data in student/parent surveys and have a professional evaluator whom we contract with to evaluate our data. Student achievement is measured by academic success and completion rates. GEAR UP students are tracked beginning in the 8th grade, all the way through high school and into college.

Who is responsible for maintaining the documentation?

The Director of Finance and Strategic Measures, Timpi Webber, along with the Controller, Mike Evans, Colorado Department of Higher Education, manages the fiscal responsibilities of Colorado GEAR UP. Every transaction, payment request, and function request requires approval and sign-off by the Project Director before payment is made. The GEAR UP office and the Colorado Department of Higher Education keeps copies of all documentation pertaining to expenditures.

12. If your project has a scholarship component for postsecondary education, please provide: a) information about the amount of scholarship money (Federal and non-Federal matching funds) that has been reserved and/or obligated; b) information regarding where scholarship funds are held pending distribution to former GEAR UP students

Each year, 50% of the federal award, \$2,500,000 is placed into a scholarship trust fund for GEAR UP students to access upon matriculation to college. The trust is managed by the Colorado Department of Higher Education and is only for the GEAR UP students that participated in the program. No funds have been distributed yet, since current cohorts are only in 8th-10th grades. The funds will be distributed at census date to financial aid offices to GEAR UP scholars when they are eligible. GEAR UP will provide a list of scholarship recipients to every eligible college to which a GEAR UP student will be attending and ensure that the student understands the details of their scholarship. The amount of the scholarship will be determined prior to student matriculating to college. The program will have enough funds to ensure that each student receives the minimum required amount but the actual amount should be much higher

SECTION VI: SURVEY DATA

1. Survey Administration:

Describe the Administration of Your Surveys:

Students participated in an online survey in January. The survey was facilitated by their pre-collegiate advisors. Survey groups were small with 5-15 students per group. Every Friday the GEAR UP central office ran reports to check completion rates. These reports were shared weekly with all GEAR UP pre-collegiate advisors. This process helped us monitor the progress and offer support when needed. Parent surveys were also administered in the month of January. All pre-collegiate advisors hand delivered the parent surveys to students during the first week of the month. Students were instructed to take the survey home for parents to fill out. Incentives were offered to help remind students to return the completed parent survey. In addition, many pre-collegiate advisors did reminder phone calls to the parents and daily reminders to the students. To ensure an adequate response rate, the pre-collegiate advisors were asked to email an update of collected parent surveys weekly to the GEAR UP Central office. This allowed us time to provide feedback and incorporate strategies when needed. Additionally, we developed a partnership with an independent evaluator to serve as our data source for student and parent surveys. We will continue to meet with the evaluator several times each year to discuss implementation and the future direction of the project.
